Winter Field Trip

It was a cold night but the warm welcome we received from Colville Monument Works was great. Our last field trip took us to the offices of the monument works to see the process of sand blasting for the lettering and pictures that can be carved into head stones and other rocks. It starts with a design which can be done by computer and personal preference input. Then a pattern is printed and placed on the stone. This has varying levels of difficulty from designs, to rough/ smooth or flat/ round rocks. The size of the rock and lettering can make the engraving tricky. The grit used is zirconium silicate sized 36/80 grit which is reused as it is vacuumed and swept from the blasting cabinet. When the pattern has been patiently and firmly applied, the rock is placed on a table, leveled and squared to the blasting machine, then placed in the blasting cabinet which makes about 6 passes over the rock depending on the hardness of the rock/slab. The rock is cleaned and paint is applied to the inside of the lettering.

Camille Bateman said that most of the customers coming into the store are in a somber mood but

Faceting Machine for Sale

I have a Fac-ETTE, Gem Master II faceting machine with the right hand mast, left hand water supply and EMS meter. Do on-line search for pictures of unit.

It has the standard transfer fixture, the original books, fuses, brass caliper, etc. It has a complete set of 27 dops (10 cone, 10 flat and 7 Vee).

I have 4 index plates for the unit, a 64, 80, 96 and 120. It also has the 45 degree table adapter. I have 14 each 8 inch laps (180, 2 ea 260, 360, 600, 800, 3 ea 1200, 1500, 8000, Finalap, a master lap, and a lucite lap). Most are Lapcraft, Crystalite, and Raytech laps. Most have never been used. I have 2 packages of mylar laps in aluminum oxide (1.5 micron and .3 micron) and a Specka 1.5 micron.

I also have the Meet Point Faceting Book and the seven volumes of pattern books.

The machine itself has been used but 2 or 3 times. I know how to do it, but not enough time and price of rough has gotten too high.

They still sell these machines at over \$5000.00 for the basic machine. I want \$4000.00 for all of it. Unit was purchase in 2006.

Australian Amateur Prospector Finds Massive Gold Nugget



An amateur prospector in the Australian state of Victoria has astonished experts by unearthing a gold nugget weighing 5.5kg (177 ounces).

The unidentified man, using a handheld metal detector, found the nugget on Wednesday, lying 60cm underground near the town of Ballarat.

Its value has been estimated at more than A\$300,000 (\$315,000: £197,000).

Local gold experts say gold has been prospected in the area for decades, but no such discovery had been made before.

"I have been a prospector and dealer for two decades, and cannot remember the last time a nugget over 100 ounces (2.8kg) has been found locally," said Cordell Kent, owner of the Ballarat Mining Exchange Gold Shop.

"It's extremely significant as a mineral specimen. We are 162 years into a gold rush and Ballarat is still producing nuggets - it's unheard of."

Chips From The Outcrop

It may still be winter, but things are already happening which will affect our local rock and gem shows in 2014. The Rock Rollers Spokane show will take place again this year on the first weekend in May, the same weekend as the Bloomsday race. Both attendance and sales for last year's Bloomsday weekend show were down, so the Rollers are negotiating with the Spokane Convention Center for an earlier date for 2014. As of now, it appears that the only date available for the convention center will be the last weekend in March.

That weekend, of course, is the same weekend we usually have our show, as we do this year. Since we share materials and show participants between the Rock Rollers and Panorama clubs, and many dealers participate in both shows, this creates a problem for both clubs. To try deal with this situation early, the Rollers show chairman contacted me last month to see if we might have any "wobble room" with our 2014 show date. So far, it looks like we may be able to move our 2014 date up to the middle of March. We should know the final date for the Spokane show by the end of February.

Down here in Suncrest, the "banana belt" of Stevens County, most of our snow is gone, which got me thinking about field trips. I looked

again through the recently-inherited folder of club materials, and found an interesting list of prospective single-day field trips. With a minor addition, this is the list included below. So, please take a look at the list and: (1) see if the information appears accurate, and if not, please provide me the information needed to fix it; (2) decide which of these places you would be most interested in visiting this summer. There is also a list of multi-day potential excursions, which I am still working on. (The Rock Rollers are also looking at trips to a number of these places, but have not finalized their field schedule yet.)

The program for our February meeting will be a Smithsonian Institution video entitled "Gemstones of America." It was narrated by Efrem Zimbalist, Jr., and features gems from localities within the United States.
