Jim Creek




2006 was a busy summer. We went on this trip to Jim Creek and then on a trip to Metaline to look for trilobites. Somehow this story was lost in the 2007 shuffle,. Today I was cracking some of the galena rocks from the trip and they were nice, bright shiny galena crystals in massive white quartz. I told my wife that they smelled good too, but somehow a whiff of fresh sulphur doesn't do it for her. Above is a picture of Jerry Novak picking some samples from the vein just uphill from the main mine entrance. The entrance was a shaft kept open by rotten log cribbing descending into unfathomed water, not the kind of place you want to pick around in.

There is a creek rushing by just below the mine entrance and another glory hole on the other side of that. After picking rocks at the mine itself till lunch, we went

up the road another mile or so to check out some nice

granular pyrite seams in the boulders there.



To get there, we all gathered at the train station in Ione. None of the roads from there are great but at least it is not far. Actually, the Smackout Pass Road is pretty good. About 3.5 miles up that road, a road to the right goes toward the Jim Creek Mine. This is a really dicey road. If you go on up to the Cameron Meadows Road, USFS # 1715430 (only the 5430 will show on the stake at the start of the road,) it is in better shape. There were some good moose and elk hunting stories associated with this road, so keep your eyes open. I heard later that the old Utacan Mine up USFS Rd #1715423 to your left near the top of a hill about a mile up the road is worth seeing too. It cut off across a power line right-of-way. The Jim Creek Rd, #1715421 goes right just past that and goes north of the power line corridor. The first site we visited was probably just downstream from the Utacan Mine and not as far up as the red dot on this map. Look for a parking area with a stream running under the road.

The mine itself is a little ways to the east of the road above the creek. There is a well-worn path. The vein travels up the hill and there are some interesting minerals cropping out at the top of the hill above the mine. There are tailings all around the mine shaft that will have samples of the lead ore. The gray crystals are the lead, those that look a little more brownish are zinc ore, Sphalerite. In the Metaline mining district, there is usually 3 times more zinc than lead. In the map to the left, the green and bluish areas are meta-sedimentary rock, limestone. In the pinkish areas, molten granite has pushed up into the older limestone. Some interesting minerals can sometimes be found on the edges between the two types of rock. The yellow is more recent glacial till left above the bedrock.

Beyond the Jim Creek Mine, someone has pushed a bulldozer through the debris alongside the road. The road itself is choked with brush and several people elected to walk rather than scratch their cars in it. It became a rather long walk, especially for Steve Fox, who usually carries a large sledge hammer with him. We were glad to have him arrive though because about a mile up that road, is an area to the northeast of the road that has some large boulders with a pretty reddish pyrite in them. They are too heavy to carry and too hard to break up with a small rock hammer.



Here we have Sylvia Petty and some other folks trying to break out some samples of pyrite at the far end of Jim Creek Rd. This area looked like it could get pretty wet in the spring, maybe not the best time to visit. Below are the pyrite to the left and galena to the right.


