Arden Fritz gave the Treasurer's report in Johnie's absence. Thanks, Arden.






From there we went to the Prineville Pow Wow




Chips Off The Outcrop

Grains of Sand

<u>COMMON ROCK TYPES OF</u> <u>NORTHEASTERN</u> <u>WASHINGTON,</u> <u>ADJACENT BRITISH</u> <u>COLUMBIA & IDAHO</u>

This long title belies a simple and easy-toread document produced by none other than our club president, Bruce Hurley. It describes the most common rock types and how they were formed, essentially the cliff notes to Geology 101. It will be very handy for those planning to take the geology tour described in Chips from the Outcrop. We will have copies printed for those attending the club meeting next Tuesday. More copies will be available on request or you can download the file from Panoramagem.com. Sand grains magnified 110-250 times reveal each grain is unique.



The tip of a spiral shell has broken off and become a grain of sand. After being repeatedly tumbled by action of the surf this spiral sand grain has become opalescent in character.
