More Saddle Mt.

There is a lot more to getting petrified wood specimens from Saddle Mt. than just getting there and digging as shown in these photos from Debbie Gibbens. For one thing, you are on top of a mountain with a fabulous view of the Columbia



River far below. (I'm going to assume that the orchards that are little white squares in this picture are cherries that are covered with bird netting.)

You might lose focus on the rocks that were once trees buried right at your feet. In the distance in this picture you can see the basalt cliffs where the river cut through the 20 million year old basalt flows that cover the Columbia basin. As the flows were growing, river waters formed a ring of lakes around the flow that became a home to diatoms. Diatoms are mostly silicon. Dead trees became submerged in this soup and over time absorbed the silicon. When the lakes dried the wood became petrified with silicon.

Although getting there and finding rocks might be most of the fun, there is still a lot to do when you get home. Some folks might balk at cleaning rocks in the kitchen, but when a good part of your kitchen is already rock, that might not be a problem. With a little rubbing and scrubbing you get a pretty nice collection to look at.



And the fun might not stop there, with a little work, well actually a lot of work, in the rock shop, you can get slabs and cabs and who knows what else from these beauties. Often times they even glow under UV light. (Thanks Debbie and Dennis for these great pictures.)

#### **Strange Properties of Tourmaline and Quartz**



Following are the definitions of several properties

of certain minerals.

#### Piezoelectricity -

The electric charge that accumulates in certain materials in response to applied mechanical stress. The most common use of this property is for accurate timing of clocks.




Tourmaline and quartz (especially quartz) crystals will

change shape if a voltage is applied to two faces. An electrical circuit is used to apply this voltage in the form of a pulse that coincides with the natural frequency of the crystal. An oscillation results that is very accurate and can be used to tune radios and make clocks accurate.

Tourmaline is sometimes used to make pressure transducers to measure very short duration pressures (such as the pressure pulse generated

when firing a gun). Quartz pressure transducers are the standard for measuring blast pressures. (I have been using tiny quartz transducers made by Kistler and others manufacturers for over 40 years.)



#### **Triboluminescence**

Triboluminescence

 Light caused by the excitation of electrons during the rubbing, crushing, or tearing of a material. Quartz is one of the minerals that shows triboluminescence.


**Thurmoluminescence** – A phenomenon in which certain minerals release previously absorbed radiation upon being moderately heated.

**Chemiluminescence** – Emission of light as a result of a chemical reaction.

### **Map to McDermitt**

We have a lot of nice rocks up here in Northeast Washington. What we don't have much of are good agates, jasper, obsidian or thundereggs. All of those and a lot more are available on a trip scheduled for the 20-24th of June to McDermitt, Nevada and surrounding areas. Mike Shaw is organizing this trip and it looks like one for the bucket list. You can contact him for specifics, mikeshawmoose@yahoo.com. There are links to both his map and his email address on our website, panoramagem.com.

McDermitt is right where Highway 95 crosses the Idaho/Nevada line. The main campsite is a few miles west of McDermitt. There are six sites shown on Mike's map but side trips to Glass Butte, the opal mines of Paradise Valley, Nevada and sunstone near Hart Mountain are all within striking distance. Mike has trips for thundereggs scheduled on Monday June 22nd and to Glass Butte for obsidian on Tuesday, June 23rd.



Here are some of the highlights:

- Gary Green Jasper: (Larsonite) Hard rock tools are required here. Look around before deciding on a spot. Many qualities and colors are available.
- Opalite Mine: Massive pieces of Agate, a neat place. Stay out of the adits. Very Dangerous!
- Fortification Agate: Banded Purple agate
- <u>Carnival Agate</u>: Most of the material here is a gorgeous opal/agate type rock, but it's super brittle. There's some other nice material here too. It's just under the surface and sticking out in places.

- <u>Cordero Mine</u>: lots of different agates, jaspers, wonderstone, etc
- Purple Cow Agate: Purple Cow Agate is found here. Look in the draw and surface collect. When ou find some on the surface, it pays to dig about 6 inches or so, and there's lots to be found. Chip off a corner to verify color.

Mike says: "The Gary Green and Purple Cow are my favorites here, although the other stuff may be yours. Almost anywhere in the loop you walk, you'll find petrified wood. The Cordero Mine is a treasure trove of different colored agate and jasper, and the floor of the open pit mine is solid agate." The area is arid with no cover.

The best vehicle would probably be a self-contained RV. But lodging is available near the Casino on Hwy 95. Looking at the number of different rocks you could collect, you might want a trailer just to haul them back.

Another nice thing about Mike's Google map is that you can zoom in on the sites. Here is a close-up of the Cordero mine. It looks like you could spend all day just trying to see it all. Even



from the air it is full of color.
This looks like a great trip. If you go, bring me back some pretty rocks.
