

Our members include a wide range of knowledgeable people with backgrounds in these areas as well as professionals and subject matter experts in a wide variety of gem and mineral related topics.

Our meetings consist of a brief routine business discussion followed by a brake for refreshments and socializing before an educational program covering some aspect of our hobby or a related topic. These meetings are a great place to share information and learn from those with extensive experience. The meetings often have a raffle with prizes donated by our members. A silent action is also held during the refreshment break with the proceeds going to the club's scholarship fund.

The gem and mineral club was founded in 1996 by two fellows that met in a barber shop in Kettle Falls. They put an ad in the paper to see if anyone else was interested and we've been having fun every since. The club has field trips in the summer and an annual rock show every year in March. This year (2022) it will be Friday and Saturday of the second week end. We also have activities to raise money for scholarships. In the club's twenty plus years we have given out about \$60,000 dollars to students from Colville, Chewelah, and Kettle Falls.

Inside of the Brochure

Identify the "Rock or Mineral" Last month's rock or mineral:



Chalcopyrite: It is a brass-yellow mineral with a chemical composition of CuFeS₂. It occurs in most sulfide mineral deposits throughout the world and has been the most important ore of copper for thousands of years. It crystallizes in the tetragonal system and has a hardness of 3.5 to 4 on the Mohs scale. It has a specific gravity ranges between 4.1 and 4.3. Its streak is diagnostic as green tinged black. The mineral in the purest form contains 34.5% Cu, 30.5% Fe, and 35.0% S.

When exposed to air it tarnishes to a dull, gray-green color, but in the presence of acids the tarnish can develop a red to blue to purple iridescence. The iridescent colors of weathered chalcopyrite attract attention. Some souvenir shops sell chalcopyrite that has been treated with acid as "peacock ore."

"Peacock ore" is a more appropriate name for the mineral bornite.

Chalcopyrite oxidizes to a variety of oxides, hydroxides, and sulfates. Associated copper minerals include the sulfides bornite (Cu₅FeS₄), chalcocite (Cu₂S), covellite (CuS), digenite (Cu₉S₅); carbonates such as malachite and azurite, and rarely oxides such as cuprite (Cu₂O). It is rarely found with native

copper (it is the uncombined form of copper which occurs as a natural mineral).

Chalcopyrite is often confused with pyrite and gold since all three of these minerals have a yellowish color and a metallic luster. Some important mineral characteristics that help distinguish these minerals are hardness and streak. Chalcopyrite is much softer than pyrite and can be scratched with a knife, whereas pyrite cannot be scratched by a knife. However, chalcopyrite is harder than gold, which, if pure, can be scratched by copper. Chalcopyrite has a distinctive black streak with green flecks in it. Pyrite has a black streak and gold has a yellow streak.
